As for events, George would list hillclimbs as his favorite followed by Auto-X and rallies but, he also enjoys the occasional club tours.

As of this writing George has been in the club for 55 years and in that time has done it all. While not as active as he once was George still contributes and is often at the club's monthly meetings. Incidentally, George was among the small group of members that met in the mideighties to decide the fate of the club and ultimately to donate from their own pockets to keep the club going (see "An Important Meeting" in the club history.)
